

Participant Lesson Plan

Title: "Life Choices of the Suffragettes"



Grade Level: Sixth grade level

Time Frame: Three 45 minute class periods

Subject: Pennsylvania History

Explain how continuity and change has influenced United States history from Beginnings to 1824.

- Women's Movement (e.g., roles and changing status of women, Margaret Brent's vote, soldier Deborah Sampson)

Objectives:

The Women's Movement in the late 1800's was an important beginning to changes in United States History for women today. The right to vote was obtained by the struggles of many women. The lifestyles of all women were changed drastically. After women won the right to vote when the 19th Amendment was adopted in 1920. In this lesson students will

- a. Analyze descriptions of the lifestyles of women in the late 1800's
- b. Understand several goals of the suffragettes

Learning Activities:

Focus Activity: Today's young women have the freedom when they graduate from high school to choose whatever career they desire. Women and girls in the late 1800's were not permitted the same freedom as men. Look at the photo "A Graduate's Dream". What do you see in the picture? Is it a scary dream? Write a short paragraph the girl might write about her dream.

Inquiry Activity: Carrie Chapman Catt was a noted leader in the Women's Suffrage movement. As president of the National American Women's Suffrage Association in 1900, she gave many lectures and speeches. Read the third page of "Do You Know", by Carrie Chapman Catt. Make a list of some of the ideas that Carrie and others had about the inequalities women faced. (Note: This may be provided to students as a handout or the document may be viewed online.)

Application Activity: Look at the photo, "The Sky is Her Limit". What do you see? Is this photo meaningful today? Participate in a class discussion about women's rights. Then, using what you have learned, draw a poster that might have been used by the suffragettes in the early 1900's.



Assessment:



The following 10-point scale would be used for each activity-- the paragraph, the list, and the poster. In total students may earn 30 points.

- 1 point: turning in assignment on time
- 1 point: neatness
- 5 points: content
- 3 points: creativity
