

Participant Lesson Plan

Title: The Unknown Civil War **Grade Level:** Grades 6 - 8


Time Frame: 6 to 7 class periods **Subject:** Language Arts/Library

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School District: Trinity Area School District



Many studies of the Civil War are known for issues on slavery, Abraham Lincoln or Civil War battles. This lesson will help students gain an awareness of a little-known aspect of the war that went on in the south and centered around General Grant and the Jewish population of the south using Carol Matas' book, The War Within: A Novel of the Civil War. Students will examine primary source materials to correlate the fictional text with actual visual, auditory and manuscript accounts as found in the American Memory collections.

Objectives:

At the conclusion of this lesson, students will be able to:

- Examine primary source materials to gain knowledge of the little-known war within the Civil War that was known as General Grant's Order No. 11;
- Use historical fiction to understand the human aspect of the Jewish population of the South:
- Relate primary source materials from American Memory collections to passages, characters, and events from the novel;
- Develop research skills and strategies for finding information.

Learning Activities:

Focus Activity: Explore historical documents related to the novel.

Go to From Haven to Home: Confronting Challenges in American Memories. Scroll down to the 12th item, General Grant's Notorious Order No. 11. Read through this as well as President Lincoln's Response to Order No. 11. Click on the manuscript document images for each page. The document will appear on a separate screen. Scan through these documents and read the first three chapters of *The War Within: A Novel of the Civil War*. Answer the following questions.

- 1. What was Grant's Order No. 11?
- 2. What do you think Grant hoped to accomplish with Order No. 11?
- 3. Were there any protests against Order No. 11?
- 4. What was President Lincoln's response?
- 5. What are your feelings concerning Order No. 11? Were you surprised that General Grant wrote this?
- 6. How do you feel about President Lincoln rescinding the order?

Inquiry Activity: Discover the Civil War through photographs and music.

Go to <u>Selected Civil War Photographs</u>. Select Browse, and then choose a subject. Click on "Gallery View" to see thumbnail images of the documents. Click on an image to enlarge it for better viewing. When you have found an image to your liking, use the <u>What Do You See: Photo Analysis Guide</u> to record your thoughts. (You may print out the guide.)

Go to <u>Band Music From the Civil War Era</u> in American Memory. Scroll half-way down the page to "Special Presentations" and choose "A Concert for Brass, Band, Voices and Piano". On the next screen, listen to at least 3 selections (using the MP3 File). When you find an audio recording you like, listen to it while using the <u>What Do You Hear?</u>: <u>Listening Guide</u> to record your thoughts. (You may print out the guide.)

Application Activity:

As a culminating class activity, we will review the questions from the focus activity concerning General Grant's Order No. 11. We will review the Photo Analysis Guide and the Listening Guide. We will also finish reading the book, *The War Within: A Novel of the Civil War.* Finally, we will discuss how the primary sources enable a more complete understanding of the time period and the specific events featured in the book.

Assessment:

Evaluation will be based on the completion of the following four activities. Each activity (Focus, Photo Analysis, Listening Guide, and Reflection of Primary Sources) is worth 25 points totaling 100 points altogether.

Complete 4 activities = 80-100 points to earn an "A"

Complete 3 activities = 55-75 points to earn a "B"

Complete 2 activities = 30-50 points to earn a "C"

Complete 1 activity = 10-25 points to earn a "D"

Complete 0 activities = 0 points to earn an "F"

- 1. Completion of Focus Activity questions. (25 points)
- 2. Completion of Photo Analysis Guide. (25 points)
- 3. Completion of Listening Guide. (25 points)
- 4. Students will write reflections of ways the Primary Sources they found in American Memories compare with the fiction book. (25 points)
