A LIBRARY OF CONGRESS PRIMARY SOURCE STARTER WHAT WAS SHE THINKING?

Quick and Easy activity ideas to start using Library of Congress primary sources in the classroom

Teacher Instructions

Goal

Students will examine a photo taken outside of the National Association Opposed to Woman Suffrage (NAOWS) building and will begin to think critically about how attitudes towards women's suffrage and other issues of that time period impacted daily life.

Background

Women's suffrage was an important advancement in United States history. This photo is believed to be taken in 1911. During this period, suffragettes were organizing a movement to pass national legislation allowing women to vote in every state. (At this time only a few states allowed women to vote.) The National Association Opposed to Woman Suffrage (NAOWS) organization formed in New York City in 1911 during a convention of state anti-suffrage groups. The NAOWS believed that women's suffrage would decrease their work in communities and their ability to effect societal reforms.

Activities

Teachers can have students:

• Examine the photo and give their initial reactions

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- Write and discuss what they know about the women's suffrage movement
- Write and discuss any information that they know about the time period when this photograph was taken
- Have them develop idea about what the people in the photo are saying or thinking and write a caption for the photograph

You can also use <u>primary source teacher guides and analysis tools</u> from the Library of Congress to help students to complete an in depth analysis of the photograph.

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Student Worksheet

Background: This photo is believed to be taken in 1911. - 4. Write your own caption of the image to sum up what is happening. Remember, a caption should be short and to the point.
